






## Pawsome Visitors

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## history trip to Poland

During February half term, a group of 22 students and 2 teachers went on a history trip to Krakow. Poland. Whilst we were there, we visited 3 museums - The Schindler Factory, The Jewish Galicia Museum and The Pharmacy Under the Eagle. At each of the museums, we had our own tour guide who showed us round and told us different facts about each museum. At the Jewish Galicia Museum, after our tour, we were fortunate enough to meet the daughter of a holocaust survivor, who told us about her mother's life and shared some artefacts with us. The Pharmacy Under the Eagle was a pharmacy in a Jewish ghetto, the only one to stay open in the ghetto, owned and run by Tadeusz Pankiewicz.

The most poignant experience of the trip was the visit to Auschwitz, and Auschwitz - Birkenau. During the tour of Auschwitz, we were given a headset each which our tour guide spoke to us through. He showed us round some of the buildings which the Jews stayed in, and the harsh, cramped conditions which they faced. We were also shown the great mass of shoes, suitcases, fake limbs, glasses, pots and pans, and even some of the children's clothes during the tour. We were then taken into the gas chamber of Auschwitz which I can say for everyone that we all found this incredibly heart wrenching and moving. After our tour of Auschwitz, we took the coach a short way to Auschwitz - Birkenau where we received another tour. We saw where the Jews were sorted, either straight to a gas chamber, or to be assigned a job. We then walked the 800m which the Jews had to walk to their inevitable death, the gas chamber. We were then taken into another building where some of the Jews slept in unimaginable, tough conditions.

Each evening, we were able to explore Kraków's beautiful old town, where we bought souvenirs and then went to restaurants for dinner. There was still some time to unwind, have fun and enjoy the shared experience. To relax we went bowling as a group in the evening following both trips to Auschwitz.

Earlier this month, a small group of Year 7 and Year 9 students were invited to visit a local workplace, Scorpion Vision, via the Hampshire Careers Hub. The students enjoyed a tour of the company's facility in Lymington that designs and builds imaging products for a wide range of clients. They are an awardwinning technology business at the forefront of their field and a global leader in 3D machine vision. The students even had the chance to operate one of the robotic automated systems and learn how this top of the range technology is used in various manufacturina such a processes system that inspects the LED panels used on the front of buses, a 2D vision system that locates pet food pouches in warehouses and special cameras that can scan, measure and even trim vegetables ready to be sold in supermarkets!

### Speech & Language Therapy (SALT)

We recently introduced targeted and language therapy speech interventions, which are run by Mrs Helsby, who is supporting a number of students in this area.
